NORTHAMPTON — Christmas came slightly early for 39 children living at the Lumber Yard affordable housing development on Friday, when they all received a new bike as a gift from Red Stone Equity Part-ners, in collaboration with Way Find-

ers, which manages the building. Red Stone, a real estate invest-ment firm that has offices in Boston and New York City, is one of the fi-nancial partners of Way Finders and nancial partners of way funders and has provided tax credits to afford-able housing projects across the country. Mike Murphy, the director of investor relations at Red Stone, was present for the giving of the bikes on Friday.

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"One thing that we've tried to do over the past few years is align ourselves more with the cause of supporting affordable housing," he said. "Part of that is giving back to the communities in which we've invested in."
