Bringing home stability with compassion and insight

During fiscal year 2023, Way Finders met our region's housing challenges and opportunities in a multitude of ways, from the individual level to the legislative level. From working directly with homeless families to educating the decision-making of our elected officials. And so much in between, from employment support services and education for first-time homebuyers to the pursuit of new affordable housing developments.

We had a positive impact on the lives of more than 57,000 people across western Massachusetts—the largest number we have ever helped in one year. Most walked through the doors of 1780 Main Street to seek assistance at our Springfield Housing Center. They came burdened not only by the cost of housing but by myriad stressors that compound housing hardships, including barriers to employment, literacy, technology, transportation, and more. I can't praise staff enough for the patience, assistance, and kindness they extended to all those in need. Time and time again.

From my vantage point—I've been at the helm of Way Finders since July 2020, and in the world of affordable housing for more than two decades—housing is one of the most persistent social inequities to emerge since the pandemic, which saw an unabated rise in prices and demand. Everyone is talking about housing because finding housing you can afford to rent or buy is a challenge faced by everyone, regardless of income or zip code. And the cost of housing keeps many living near breaking points, in fear of any unexpected expense or loss of income that may push them over the edge. The more than \$31 million Way Finders infused into the economy via emergency financial housing assistance proved critical in keeping thousands of residents stably housed.

In our region alone, the shortage of housing units will reach 19,000 by 2025. We advocate so strongly for proactive investment in housing because it provides so much more than shelter. It stimulates the economy and local businesses; provides diverse housing options to retain residents; revitalizes urban areas; promotes environmental sustainability; generates tax revenue; and fosters social integration. The way to build more inclusive and thriving communities is by building more housing.

No town or city can solve its housing issues alone. These are state-wide challenges that call for broad collaboration to increase all housing—rental, ownership, multifamily, and permanently affordable rental units. To preserve and rehab housing. To increase programs that bring access for renters and homeowners. To expand access to transportation and employment. And to create solutions rooted in the understanding of how vital housing is to helping people and places flourish.

With her election in 2022, I was appointed by Governor Healey to co-chair the gubernatorial Transition Committee to Advance Affordable, Abundant Housing. It was an honor to help start guide a statewide housing effort.

And, since May 2022, it has been Way Finders' privilege to convene the Western Massachusetts Housing Coalition, a collaboration of more than 50 organizations and entities that work in and serve our region's four counties. Dedicated to advancing legislative priorities that address our region's housing needs, the Coalition was poised and ready in fall 2023 to help inform the state's housing bond bill—the \$4 billion Affordable Homes Act put forth by Governor Healey to propel production and programs that increase housing options—and ensure that the needs of our region were voiced.

I am extremely grateful to our partners and donors, who are so essential to our work, and to each member of our team for their caring commitment. Without which we couldn't drive the changes we wish to see in this place we call home.



Ringing out in Liberty Heights: a story of generational wealth building

Newlyweds Isaiah and Priscilla Delmoral's path to first-time homeownership included a stint living at home with his parents and siblings, which allowed them to save money and go back to school. They also dedicated a year to building financial capacity, via education and coaching from Way Finders. All while keeping their eyes on the prize: being able to make and sustain a home purchase.

Says Isaiah: "We've been blessed to benefit from Way Finders' good work. And I'm extremely grateful to my amazing parents for helping us get a leg up. For us, homeownership means creating generational wealth and changing the trajectory of our family line. And it means breaking paradigms that exist right now in Black and brown communities. Way Finders' programs change the game for a lot of us."

There's a new landlord in Westfield: First-time homeowner Luz Caballero

"I still can't believe that I'm the owner of a house. In my mind, it still feels like I'm renting. The house is everything I was looking for!" says Luz Caballero, a 2022 graduate of Way Finders' Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS) Program and the first person in her family to purchase a home. Almost 30 years ago, Caballero, a mother of five, received a Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher. The encouragement to pursue a two-family home came from FSS Specialist Evelyn Baez.

"If it wasn't for Way Finders, I would never have been able to do it. If you don't know where to start, that's where Way Finders comes in. They offer all these awesome programs. And you have people like Evelyn who stay side by side with you," says Caballero, who had to stay patient in a challenging post-pandemic real estate market. When her first-time homebuyer certification ran out—it's good for two years—she took the workshop again. "I never gave up, I wanted to be ready for an opportunity."

Through Way Finders, I got my life back

When Lilliya Salem of Springfield wanted to get her life back, Way Finders had what she needed, when she needed it. She moved in with her young triplets to a Residential Resource Center, then connected with the Secure Jobs Initiative. Today, she loves her job and has her eyes on homeownership.

"I really find joy and happiness in being able to help somebody, especially somebody who is struggling to recover from addiction. I know what it's like for people who are in recovery, thinking people will judge you, not knowing what to do next. It's hard to get your life back. And through Way Finders, I got my life back.

"I'm so grateful that I was able to work with Job Developer Carmela. When you have no education, you doubt yourself that you can do it. And when Carmela came into the picture, she was like, 'Yes, you can do it.' She gave me that boost of confidence."

Catching up with local landlord and Safe Step graduate Yoselin of Springfield

When local landlord, restaurant manager, and Safe Step graduate Yoselin of Springfield turns it up in her kitchen, the dish she is most apt to prepare—sancocho Dominicano, a spicy stew of meat and root vegetables—is a testament to her home country. And what she cooks, she shares: with neighbors, family, friends.

As Yoselin explains, Safe Step—Way Finders' supportive housing for survivors of domestic abuse—was pivotal to her path to homeownership and economic mobility. "I don't get embarrassed talking about it. I say, 'I came from a shelter, and I did good there. The staff were great to me.' If it wasn't for Safe Step, I wouldn't have been able to get everything I have today. It helped me save money, so I could buy things little by little. It put a roof over my children's heads."

On the day we met up with Tia Best, assistant manager at two local Subway stores, at our Springfield Housing Center, she was dressed for work. And she was desperately needed at work. But, for this one morning, she said she wasn't available. She didn't want to miss her graduation appointment with FSS Program Specialist Sonia Colon, who came bearing two checks—a real one and a big photogenic one.

Says Best: "Oh, my goodness, I can't believe it. I've never had this much money in my hand at one time! This money is financial freedom, to make sure we're comfortable. So, when emergencies come, we don't have to stress the way we used to."
